1 And Just Like That...

Ohio-born **Sarah Jessica Parker** has been a fixture in show business since her Broadway debut in 1976. Touring with “The Sound of Music” alongside four of her siblings, Parker eventually took on the title role in “Annie” on Broadway. She made her mark on television with the sitcom “Square Pegs” and captivated audiences in films like “Hocus Pocus,” “The Family Stone,” and “LA Story” before achieving iconic status as Carrie Bradshaw in “Sex and the City.” In 1997, Parker married actor Matthew Broderick. The couple, who have shared the Broadway stage, reside in Manhattan with their three children and also enjoy time in County Donegal, Ireland. The fashion icon, who will turn 60 on March 25, is set to reprise her role as Carrie Bradshaw in the third season of “And Just Like That...”, premiering this year. Reflecting on her age, Parker remarked, “I don’t really think about my age. I don’t see it as something to worry about.”



2 Not a Desperate Housewife

“Desperate Housewives” star **Eva Longoria**, a former beauty pageant contestant from Corpus Christi, Texas, began her career with small roles on “Beverly Hills, 90210” and “General Hospital” before joining the cast of “The Young and the Restless.” The youngest of four sisters, Longoria grew up on a ranch, worked at Wendy’s during high school, and earned a B.S. in kinesiology. While starring in “Desperate Housewives,” she earned a master’s degree in Chicano studies and learned Spanish. Longoria and her husband, businessman José Antonio Bastón, married in 2016 and, along with their son Santiago, split their time between Spain and Mexico. In 2024, she guest-starred on “Only Murders in the Building.” Reflecting on her upcoming 50th birthday on March 15, Longoria said, “Age is just a number. I refuse to believe my greatest success is behind me.”

3 Iron Man

Robert Downey Jr., who turns 60 on April 14, was born and raised in Manhattan by filmmaker Robert Downey Sr. and actress Elsie Downey. He made his acting debut at the age of five, playing a puppy in his father’s film “Pound.” As a child, he studied ballet and attended high school in Santa Monica, CA, alongside future stars Rob Lowe and Sean Penn. Downey Jr. gained early recognition with roles in films like “Weird Science” and “Less Than Zero,” before transitioning to more mature roles in “Chaplin” and “Natural Born Killers.” A former “SNL” cast member and “Ally McBeal” regular, he is best known for his iconic portrayals of “Iron Man” and “Sherlock Holmes” – roles he will reprise in upcoming sequels. The Oscar-winning “Oppenheimer” actor met his wife, producer Susan Downey, on a film set, and they have been married since 2005. They reside on their Southern CA ranch with their two children and a variety of animals, including alpacas, cows, and pigs. Reflecting on his age, Downey Jr. has said, “I always think of myself as, like, 10 years old.”



4 At Your Service

Best known for his Oscar-winning role as Lt. Dan Taylor in “Forrest Gump” alongside Tom Hanks, **Gary Sinise** was born in a small town outside of Chicago, IL. Just a few years after high school, he co-founded the Steppenwolf Theater Company. Sinise, who turns 70 on March 17, has also earned accolades for portraying historical figures like President Harry S. Truman and George C. Wallace. He founded The Gary Sinise Foundation, which has raised over \$300 million for veterans. An honorary Marine and author of “Grateful American: A Journey from Self to Service,” Sinise also plays bass for the Lt. Dan Band, named after his iconic “Forrest Gump” character, and has performed on USO tours worldwide. He is married to Moira Harris, a former actress he met at Steppenwolf. After 35 years in Hollywood, the couple recently relocated to Nashville, TN.

5 The Queen of Country

Reba McEntire, who grew up on a cattle ranch in Oklahoma and turns 70 on March 28, comes from a family of world-champion cowboys. By ninth grade, she and her younger siblings formed the Singing McEntires, performing at rodeos. At 20, she was discovered while singing the national anthem at a rodeo and landed her first record deal. The award-winning country singer has starred on Broadway in “Annie Get Your Gun” and in her own sitcom “Reba.” Since 2023, McEntire has been a celebrity coach on NBC’s “The Voice.” An accomplished author, her latest book is “Not That Fancy.” She also owns Reba’s Place, a restaurant and music venue in Atoka, OK, and has her own footwear and clothing lines. Most recently, she’s been featured in the hit NBC comedy “Happy’s Place.” Reflecting on her journey, McEntire says, “I’m thankful for where I am. Can’t do anything about what happened in the past, and don’t put your worries into tomorrow.”
