





2. Following Ancient Footsteps in Southern Italy

Find a dreamy spot amongst the lemon groves of the Amalfi Coast or the rugged volcanic landscape of the Isle of Sicily and make it your home base for exploring ancient Greek and Roman ruins, with stops for a lazy dip in the bright blue waters of the Mediterranean along the way.

- Near Bari, you'll find the ancient ruins of Egnazia, a once-thriving coastal town of the Messapii people. With ruins dating all the way back to the 13th century BC, its foundations and weathered columns allow a glimpse of life in the Bronze Age.
- Pompeii gets all the good press, but don't miss out on Herculaneum, in the shadow of Mount Vesuvius. This ancient Roman town was lost in the volcanic eruption of AD 79, and can be seen in all its marble-clad and frescoed splendor.
- From the ancient Greek Theatre of Taormina to Agrigento's Valle dei Templi, some of the
 best Greek ruins are found on the Island of Sicily. From Palermo, you can visit these sites, as
 well as the ruins of Syracuse and the Temples of Selinunte, whose twelve lonely, monolithic
 columns still stand from a grand 6th-century building.




Castle of Saumur - Loire's Valley, France

3. Biking the Loire Valley in France

What could be better than a day of relaxed cycling, interspersed with castles, wineries, and fine dining? The Lorie Valley boasts over 500 miles of networked bike paths over relatively flat terrain - no matter where you jump on and off, don't miss these highlights.

- The Château de Chambord is all about grandeur. Complete with a moat, 440 rooms, 365 fireplaces and 84 staircases, you'll find plenty of wow-factor in this 16th century hunting lodge. Want to stay awhile? Book a night or two in one of the guest houses on the estate.
- It won't be easy to narrow down your choices when it comes to wineries to visit along the
 way in this diverse region, but nearly all of them specialize in wines with refreshing acidity
 and minerality, making them perfect easy-drinking varieties that pair well with picnic food
 and long bike rides.
- Armchair historians should take a detour to Orleans, where there's lots to see, including the House of Joan of Arc on the spot where she stayed during the Battle of Orleans.

- Seek out shops and restaurants off the beaten track, where prices are usually lower than in the tourist center.

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
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- St. Edward's Crown is only used at the moment of coronation itself. Made from solid gold and set with semiprecious stones, this crown weighs almost 5 pounds.
- The jeweled, gold Sovereign's Orb is set in the king or queen's right hand at coronation before being set on the altar.
- The Sovereign's Sceptre with Cross has been used at every coronation since 1661.
 Prepare to be momentarily blinded by the Cullinan I diamond, which remains the largest top quality cut white diamond in the world, weighing in at 530.2 carats.


How to Do Proper Afternoon Tea
